*Skilled communication forms the foundation of effective support for patients and families as they face life-limiting illness. International guidelines do include palliative care as part of heart failure management. Symptom control and individualized prognosis can be challenging. This presentation allows us to have a unified approach when dealing with the multiple issues in the care of advanced HF patients.*

***Medical "Futility": When Treatment is Not For Cure***  
**Kathy Kortés-Miller/Dr. Kevin Miller**

*To be human is to communicate. We are all continually sending out messages to other people, whether we recognize it or not. Communication skills are of vital importance in palliative care and are at the heart of the work we do. Perhaps one of the biggest challenges faced by palliative care practitioners occurs when we are called to deliver information that the receiver does not want to receive. How do we communicate care and commitment when treatment is considered to be "futile"? What is the message we are sending? How do we want and need it to be received? This presentation will focus on the importance of caring and communication in end of life care.*

2. To examine the range of skills and interactions which underpin effective communication;
3. To reinforce the recognition of the power of language;

**1. *Respecting End of Life: A First Nations' Perspective* Allan Bonaise (Jubilee A)**

*This presentation by Alan Bonaise will explore aspects of First Nations culture related to the journey from life to death, and will include the following:*

- *The circular connection between those living and those who now live in another dimension (ancestors);*
- *The role of the naming ceremonies;*
- *The role of Elders and family in the dying person's final days and release of spirit;*
- *The various ceremonies, drumming and signing, and their relation to assisting/encouraging the spirit release;*
- *Demonstration of ceremonies, such as a smudge, pipe ceremony, and going home songs.*

**2. a) *Changes Toolkit for Palliative Care Patients and their Family Caregivers***  
**Lori Cooper**  
**(Jubilee B)**

*This presentation will describe the findings of a feasibility study conducted in Saskatchewan and Alberta. This study was the third phase of a three-phased project to develop and pilot test an intervention to help rural palliative care patients and their families deal with the significant changes they experience. The intervention entitled "Changes Toolkit" was found to be easy to use, feasible and acceptable to the study participants. Based on the participant recommendations the Toolkit has been revised and is also available online.*

*This study was funded by the CIHR ICE grant (Williams/Wilson PI). Dr Wendy Duggleby was the PI on this project.*

**b) *Developing and Pilot-testing a Finding Balance Writing Intervention for Older Adults Who Are Bereaved After Caregiving*** **Lorraine Holtslander**  
**(Jubilee B)**

*The Finding Balance Writing Intervention is a self-administered booklet that describes the processes of finding balance and provides writing assignments for each process, with examples from other bereaved caregivers. These processes are: identifying emotions, constructing a support system, and reflecting on the caregiving experience. The booklet is based on research including a grounded theory of finding balance for older adults who are bereaved and a Delphi study with bereavement experts. The pilot study was completed in the Saskatoon Health Region as well as the Regina Qu'Appelle Health Region. This intervention is a beneficial and practical tool that may improve bereavement outcomes for older adults, bereaved after caregiving for a spouse with advanced cancer.*

**3. *Compassion Fatigue: Prevention, Power and Passion*** **David Kessler**  
**(Jubilee C)**

*Palliative Care is an art and a science. We sometimes all take our work home. We can also become our work. It isn't burn out, we become tired of being compassionate all the time. We want to remain highly empathic health professionals and yet we travel in a world of grief, death, sadness and trauma. This session will focus on making a difference without it taking a toll. This is our challenge in caring.*

**1. *Facilitating a Good Death in Residential Care*** **Dr. Romaine Gallagher**  
**(Jubilee A)**

*There are multiple ways in which we can prevent end of life suffering - physical, psychological and spiritual. Dr. Gallagher will speak about how we can facilitate dying well in residential care through helping the residents and their loved ones be aware of the natural history of their diseases and being fully educated and supported to make decisions. Dr. Gallagher examines the evidence and gives ways to effect change.*

## **2. *Death at Home: Anticipation, Preparation and Implementation*** **Kathy Kortes-Miller & Dr. Kevin Miller** **(Jubilee B)**

*In palliative care we often consider a home death to be the goal; that this represents the best we can offer our patients, clients and their families. While a death at home may be the goal of some of our patients, it is not for everyone. In this presentation, we explore the evidence supporting a home death. We will look at considerations for the palliative care team, patients and care providers when contemplating and preparing for a death at home.*

*Objectives:*

- *Understand evidence to support a death at home for patients with end-stage, terminal illness;*
- *Identify factors associated with successful death at home;*
- *Consider communication techniques to engage patients and caregivers in anticipation of end-of life care in their home; and*
- *Review practical considerations in the implementation of the plan.*

## **3. *Creative Ways to Be with the Dying*** Jillian Brasch **(Jubilee C)**

*In this session, you will learn ways to creatively engage with the dying in order to help them meet their final goals. Taught from the functional and creative viewpoint of an occupational therapist, you will be introduced to practical, meaningful tools that will give you courage to be creative and vulnerable when working with the dying. The case histories to be discussed illuminate ways to problem-solve in order to help patients work beyond obstacles such as anger, fear, depression, anxiety, and physical limitations. The information is practical and insightful, leaving you with simple tools to help meet the emotional, psychological, and spiritual challenges facing the dying.*

### *Helping Children and Teens Cope with Grief: A 'Companioning' Philosophy of Caregiving*

**Purpose:** *This inspiring workshop will enhance participants' understanding of the adult helping role with children and teens in grief. A variety of important sub-topics will explore how to artfully "companion" children and teens impacted by death loss. A main theme will be that if children don't have safe places and people with whom to mourn authentically with, they are "at risk" for living in the "shadow of the ghosts" of grief.*

- *Introduction: any child old enough to love is old enough to mourn;*
- *Broader framework for loss: self, security, meaning;*

**Alan Bonaise** works in the Cultural Division of the Regional Psychiatric Centre in Yorkton. Alan has done numerous presentations and workshops around First Nations' issues. At this conference, Alan will enlighten and explain many of the cultural patterns, beliefs and ceremonies that inform end-of-life care. His presentation will provide an opportunity for those attending to learn how to offer the most appropriate and culturally sensitive care to our First Nations' population. **Jillian Brasch** OTR has been an occupational therapist since 1978 and makes her home in Santé Fe, New Mexico. She worked in a hospice for nine years, co- led art classes for People with AIDS for three years, and led bereavement support groups for six years. Her book *The Last Gifts: Creative Ways to Be with the Dying* has been featured in newspapers, magazines, and radio and won 'Best of Show' at the New Mexico Book Awards. *The Last Gifts* was also chosen as a 'Book of the Month' by the International Association of Hospice Palliative Care. In May, 2010, *The Last Gifts* won a prestigious Nautilus Award.

Jillian now spends her time leading workshops and promoting her award-winning book.

**Dr. Bradel** is a graduate of the University of Saskatchewan College of Medicine (1983) who went on to do her family medicine residency in Regina at the Plains Health Centre. After many years as a family doctor and educator at the Family Medicine Unit, she began her work at the Allan Blair Cancer Center as a clinical associate in the Radiation Therapy department. For relaxation, Teresa enjoys playing the piano.

**Lori Cooper** received her BSN in 1993 from the University of Saskatchewan. She has worked in ICU/CCU and Emergency at the Royal University Hospital since that time. She is presently completing the requirements for her MSN. The feasibility study regarding the Changes Toolkit for palliative patients and their family caregivers was her Masters thesis work. Lori presently works in the Emergency Department at the Royal University Hospital in Saskatoon and plans on working in the field of palliative care on completion of her MSN.



**Dr. Romaine Gallagher** trained as a family physician, receiving her MD from the University of British Columbia and her certification from the College of Family Physicians of Canada. She was a family physician for 12 years and has been a consultant in palliative care for over 14 years. Romaine is currently Head of Residential Care and Palliative Care Divisions of the Department of Community and Family Medicine at Providence Health Care in Vancouver, British Columbia. Romaine is also a clinical professor in the Division of Palliative Care at UBC. Her early interests in research have continued, and she

has published papers on topics ranging from public education in palliative care to new therapies for pain management. As the head of the Division of Palliative Care, Romaine has enjoyed the opportunity to participate in many local and national initiatives that are contributing to improved palliative care for all Canadians.



**Dr. Brian Goldman** hails from Toronto's Mount Sinai Hospital, and is known by millions of Canadians as CBC Radio One's 'house doctor', serving up information and advice on matters medical to twenty afternoon shows across the country. In addition, he created and hosts the CBC Radio One's *White Coat, Black Art* which was recently selected as winner in the category 'Excellence in Radio Reporting - in depth' for the 2011 CMA Media Awards for Health. The award was specifically for the two-part series "Will to Die". Brian released his first book in September 2010, *The Night Shift - Real Life in the Heart of the ER*, published by HarperCollins. He attempts to show you hour by hour what happens in the ER during a typical night shift, and to pull back the curtain to reveal the culture of emergency medicine. Dr. Brian Goldman brings a refreshing and unprecedented level of honesty in his presentations. He is a tenacious journalist and doctor who takes the most confusing and controversial issues and makes them easy for audiences to understand. **Dr. Mike Harlos** MD, CCFP, FCFP is Medical Director of Adult and Pediatric Palliative Care for the Winnipeg Regional Health Authority, and is Professor and Section Head of Palliative Medicine at the University of Manitoba. He has worked in palliative medicine for over 20 years, and has recently focused on pediatric palliative care. Mike is the Clinical Team Leader for the Canadian Virtual Hospice, and has also developed and maintains the site <http://palliative.info>, which offers palliative care links and resource material. Dr. Harlos has won numerous awards for his work. Through his lectures, Mike shares his commitment to care with family medicine residents, oncology fellows, and undergraduate medical and nursing students. He has a lengthy list of publications, and is a past winner of many awards, including the Eduardo Bruera Award recognizing excellence in the field of palliative medicine.

**Lorraine Holtzlander** RN, MN, PhD, CHPCN(c) is an Associate Professor with the College of Nursing, University of Saskatchewan. After working as a Home Care nurse in palliative care in the Saskatoon Health Region for over 20 years, Lorraine has been developing her program of research with family caregivers in palliative care, with a specific focus on providing support during bereavement. She is a principal investigator and co-investigator on several provincial, national and international grants and has published articles in peer-reviewed journals about the results of these research initiatives. Her teaching focuses on family nursing and an interdisciplinary course on qualitative research methods for graduate students.



**David Kessler** is one of the most well-known experts and lecturers on death and grief today. David is also founder of [www.Grief.com](http://www.Grief.com). His books include, *The Needs of the Dying*, *Life Lessons* (co-authored with Elisabeth Kübler-Ross) and his latest *Visions, Trips and Crowded Rooms*. David has helped thousands of men, women and children face life and death with peace, dignity and courage. His experiences have taken him from Auschwitz concentration camp to Mother Teresa's Home for the Dying Destitute in Calcutta.

David's services have been used by people such as Elizabeth Taylor and Michael Landon, and his work has been featured on CNN, NBC, PBS, CBC, Entertainment Tonight and Oprah & Friends. His volunteer work includes serving as a member of the Red Cross Mental Health Disaster Team and as a Specialist Reserve Officer for the Los Angeles Police Department, on its trauma team.

He also is Chairperson for the Hospital Association of Southern California Palliative Care Committee. David lives and works in beautiful Los Angeles where he continues to share his gifts with professionals and clients alike.

**Dr. Alana J. Kilmury** Alana obtained her Bachelor of Science degree from the University of British Columbia (UBC) and, after spending a year in Scotland, decided to apply for medical school in Europe. After completing her MD at University College Dublin, Alana came to Regina for her Family Medicine Residency. Having an interest in palliative care for many years, Alana volunteered at Canuck Place Children's Hospice in Vancouver while attending UBC, and then completed a one year fellowship in palliative care in Edmonton last year. Alana was delighted to accept a position here in Saskatchewan with the Regina Palliative Care Program, starting work July, 2011.

**Kathy Kortés-Miller** HBMT, PhD (student) Having been on both ends of the communication feedback loop (healthcare provider and patient), Kathy is passionate about encouraging healthcare providers to think deeply about the importance of communication and to hone their skills in this area. Kathy Kortés-Miller has a clinical background in social work and in music therapy. She is a sessional lecturer at Lakehead University instructing in the social work and gerontology programs, primarily for the palliative care certificate. Presently a PhD student in Educational Studies, Kathy has worked as the curriculum developer for palliative care education at the Centre for Education and Research on Aging and Health (CERAH) and on the Hospice Unit at St. Joseph's Caregroup. She is a member of the Board of Directors of Hospice Northwest and recently received an Ontario Research Council Early Researcher Award. Her research interests include enhancing palliative and end-of-life care education, inter-professional education, high fidelity simulation and mentorship.

**Dr. Kevin Kortés-Miller** After medical school, Kevin completed a residency in family medicine and has been dabbling in palliative care ever since. From 2001 – 2007, he served as attending physician on the St. Joseph's Hospital Hospice Unit. In 2007, Kevin left his family practice and the Hospice Unit to join the Regional Cancer Program as a general practitioner in Oncology and Palliative Care physician. In March, 2012 the fruits of many years work are coming to bear as Kevin migrates into the role as the first full time Palliative Care physician at the Regional Cancer Program in Thunder Bay. As of March, Kevin assumed the role of Regional Lead for Palliative Care. Kevin has been actively involved in teaching, initially as assistant professor in Family Medicine for MacMaster University and recently as assistant professor with the Northern Ontario School of Medicine (NOSM). Kevin has also been involved in local and regional palliative care education.



**Fred Nelson** MSW, Psychosocial Program Specialist, Palliative Care Program, Winnipeg Regional Health Authority. Created in 2004, this position includes providing counseling services to individuals and families coping with terminal illness and grief, providing consultation and support to members of the palliative care team, and continuing development of a model for the delivery of integrated psychosocial services throughout the Region. Fred began work in palliative care in 1978 when he joined the team at St. Boniface Hospital Palliative Care Unit. Fred has worked on many national projects and most recently was a member of the steering committee for the SCOPE project which developed competencies and curriculum for social workers in palliative care. In 2010 Fred was presented with the Canadian Hospice Palliative Care Award of Excellence.

**Dr. Ken Stakiw** has been a mainstay on the provincial medical scene for close to 40 years. He is the current Medical Director, Palliative Care Services, for the city of Saskatoon. Ken has worked on spreading care into the rural areas through the Smaller Centre Outreach program, and earlier with the Pallium Project weekend seminar sessions. Now with 14 years of Palliative Care experience, Ken's knowledge, compassion, and ability to educate others has made him a leader in the field of Palliative Care in Saskatchewan.



**Dr. Vincent Thai** MD graduated from the National University of Singapore in 1994 and has a background in both Family Medicine and Internal Medicine. He obtained his Membership exams from the Royal College of Physicians (United Kingdom) and his Masters of Medicine in both Internal Medicine and Family Medicine in 1999.
